Course Abstract

Clinicians today have a limited amount of time to treat individuals with aphasia and/or apraxia of speech (AOS), especially in acute care settings. Even in rehabilitation and beyond, the intensity and duration required to complete many standard treatment programs are impossible to achieve. At the heart of this presentation is an expanded definition of aphasia and AOS treatment that highlights all of treatment's active components, including patient and clinician beliefs and the information effect. Resulting behavior change can begin after only a few sessions, even though the clinician never introduces a list of stimuli or a traditional treatment package. Many modern clinicians also remain unsure about how to distinguish severe aphasia and AOS and about the appropriateness of treatment when one is unsure of the differential diagnosis. The core features that help distinguish the two conditions will be summarized with emphasis on how to treat when the differential diagnosis is unclear. The approach is called pairing movement and meaning. During the last 50 years, much has been reported about differences in the treatment of aphasia and AOS. Certainly the stimuli often differ and some treatment packages are more appropriate to one condition than to the other. However many of the decisions and activities critical to successful treatment are common across both conditions, and indeed, across all speech language diagnoses. One of these is the importance of complexity, another is the importance of salience. These treatment universals will be discussed. Finally, selected modern treatment packages for the two conditions will be described.

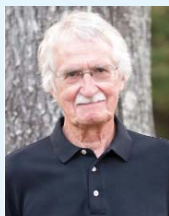
